

### THE LONG AND WINDING ROAD

Warmer weather is heading our way! Longer days and climbing temperatures means there will be more people using our roadways for exercise and entertainment.

Here are some tips on road safety and common courtesy to help us all share the road.

Turn your headlights on AT DUSK. Best practice recommended by law enforcement, defined by Statute is: Headlights

Remember you can return your materials to any public library in Ozaukee, Sheboygan, Dodge or Washington Counties. should be turned on 30 minutes after sunset and 30 minutes before sunrise and all other times when there is not sufficient natural light to render clearly visible any person or vehicle upon a highway at a distance of 500 feet." Use your headlights in fog, rain and other situations of low visibility.

Use your high beams when you need to but don't forget, failure to turn them off with a car approaching at 500 feet or less can result in a fine.

#### WHILE WALKING OR BIKING:

If you see an oncoming car, PLEASE move to the side of the road as much as possible for your own safety. Here is an excerpt of tips summarized from the Wisconsin Department of Transportation Website:

### **Reminders for drivers**

• **Slow down** when pedestrians are present.

• Where there are children, **keep your** foot over the brake to stop quickly if needed.

• Remember that children and adults have the right to be on the street on inline skates or on a bicycle, even two abreast, if obeying traffic laws.

• Always stop for a blind pedestrian, child or adult with a white cane or a dog guide. Let them complete their crossing before you move your vehicle.

• **Be alert** for children around school buses and bus stops. If red lights are flashing, you must stop at least 20 feet back.

**Put the phone down**. Pay close attention to the road ahead.

#### **Reminders for pedestrians**

• **Pay attention**. Obey traffic rules watch for cars in your area. Make eye contact with drivers if possible.



• Walk on sidewalks whenever available. If there is no sidewalk, walk facing traffic and as far from traffic as possible. If traffic is oncoming, tuck in to the side of the road as much as possible.

• **Cross streets at intersections**. If a crosswalk is not available, find a well-lit area with a clear view of traffic and wait for a gap that allows enough time to cross safely.

• Take extra care at night and at dusk. Walking at

night increases your chances of death or injury. Drivers cannot avoid what they can't see. When walking at night, wear retroreflective outdoor



clothing, shoes, or lights to make

yourself more visible. Avoid wearing dark clothing. Don't assume drivers can see you. Even a lit flashlight is helpful. **Provide proper supervision and training for children**. Young children often lack the judgment and experience to make good choices in traffic. Their smaller stature also makes them harder for motorists to see. Adults need to take special care to teach children to behave safely when they are around vehicles.

### SWALLOWING THE BITTER PILL

A long time ago, in a land far away (*not really*), a Town Board in the wooded trails and sandy beaches known as Wilson decided their residents deserved something a little more. These brave pioneers embarked on a journey to supply their Town with an amazing service called sewer.

Sewer service came at a great cost; many hours of planning, labor and a whole lot of money. In the initial planning stages it became obvious that serving the entire Town would not be possible. Large areas of farmland and acres of property that sometimes stretch miles between homes prohibited the dream of full service from being realized. Not being deterred, the board decided to start with the "neighborhoods".

The neighborhoods from Deer Gaze, to Maple Grove and from Black River to Sunnyside embarked on an amazing sewerage journey. All of the spidery trails of long and lean underground pipes and stout manholes ended up in culmination at the pump station.

The pump station was a mighty beast. With it's constant running pumps, it's formidable electrical panels and it's state of the art (at the time) ventilation system, it transported every single homes wastewater efficiently

and effectively to the water treatment plant located in the neighboring City.

Many years later, (*36 to be exact*) the mighty beast grew tired. Years of gasses, fumes and corrosion have not been kind. The pump station has done it's job reliably and tirelessly, and now is in desperate need of rehabilitation.

I know that many of you have reached out in the past few weeks regarding the new sewer rates for 2024. It is true that a rate increase from \$75/quarter to \$93/quarter is something larger than what we are used to. Unfortunately, It is necessary to keep things flowing.

The life expectancy of the system has passed and this is simply not something we can ignore. Without the pump station, every single house is susceptible to a sewer backup. That is somewhere we never want to be.

The short and not so fun answer to the question why such a big increase? Much needed repairs.

### **DOG LICENSES**

Licensing is required for all dogs over 5 months old. Fees are \$7 for a spayed or neutered dog and \$14 for intact dogs. The last day to license your dog without a late fee is March 31, 2024

Please include a copy of the current rabies certificate for each dog you are licensing along with your payment and a self addressed stamped envelope.

Please notify the Treasurer if you have a dog that is no longer licensable in the town.

### FIRE DEPARTMENT REMINDERS

DAYLIGHT SAVINGS BEGINS Sunday March 10th

With bonfire season approaching, please visit Chapter 3 of the Town of Wilson Ordinances to make sure your fire is in compliance.

Check your Smoke detector and CO detector batteries and expiration dates. CO detectors can have expiration dates on them (usually they are good for 5-7 years.) When your detector "chirps" and isn't alarming it may need to be replaced. Check the dates on your detectors and replace them when they expire.

Remember as well to purchase a weather radio for the up and coming storm season. These radios are very valuable in the event of a storm and will provide advanced warning with a built in alarm.

### What is your favorite thing about the Town of Wilson?



### GET TO KNOW THE PLAN COMMIS-SION Submitted by Erik Thelen

The Plan Commission reviews a variety of applications to make recommendations to the Town Board. Some typical projects that come before the Plan Commission include Condition-

al Use Permits, sign permits, commercial and industrial site plans, and subdivision plats.

The Plan Commission bases its recommendations on whether and how these projects:

1. Conform with the Zoning Ordinance;

2. Promote compatible development;

3. Stabilize and/or enhance the surrounding property values;

 Foster the attractiveness and functional utility of the Town as a place to live and work;

5. Preserve the character and quality of the built environment;

6. Maintain the integrity of those areas which have a discernible natural or historical character;

7. Protect public investments; and

8. Offer no threat to public health and safety

The Commission's seven members are volunteers appointed by the Town Board Chair. One additional alternate member is elected by the Town Board, and this member steps in if needed to make up a quorum. Members agree to serve three year terms, typically starting and ending in April. The Town is fortunate to have volunteers with expertise in environmental and civil engineering, professional involvement with Sheboygan County transportation and planning depart-

the town's history. The Plan Commission meets via Zoom and dial -up on the second Monday of each

month. The agenda is typically posted by the preceding Thursday and includes instructions for accessing the meeting as well as the

ments, and residents with deep knowledge of



scheduled online applications and supporting materials. Town residents are welcome to attend and contribute public comment on any Plan Commission topic at the top of each meeting.

In addition to the regularly

scheduled public comment period, the Plan Commission conducts public hearings for all subdivision preliminary plats, conditional use permits, and zoning changes. Notifications for these special public hearings are sent to the Sheboygan Press and to adjacent property owners in advance of the meeting so that the Commission can hear from residents and neighbors.

If you or someone you know would like to become involved in the work of the Plan Commission, send an email to the Town Clerk describing your interest and qualifications. The Plan Commission at present needs an alternate member. Have a look at the Town's Zoning Ordinance online at townwilson.com --> Government --> Ordinances --> Zoning Ordinance to learn more about the duties and responsibilities of Plan Commission members.

### VOTER REGISTRATION DEADLINES FOR APRIL 2 ELECTION

All voters must provide a Proof of Residence document when registering to vote by mail, in-person in the clerk's office, or at the polls on Election Day.

Voters can register in the following ways.

March 13, 2024 - Deadline to Register by Mail - Your voter registration form, along with proof of residence must be postmarked to your municipal clerk no later than March 13, 2024.

March 13, 2024 - Deadline to Register to vote online. - Voters who are able to match their name, date of birth, Wis-

consin Driver License or State ID number, and address with the Wisconsin DMV can register to vote online through March 13, 2024.

March 28, 2024 @ 4:00 p.m - Deadline to Register in Your Municipal Clerk's Office - Voters may register in-person in their municipal clerk's office during the clerk's business hours until 4:00 p.m. on March 28, 2024.

April 2, 2024 from 7:00 a.m.-8:00 p.m - Register to Vote at Your Polling Place - Voters can register to vote at their polling place on Election Day, April 2, 2024.

#### Public Works articles submitted by Ben Darkow THE FUTURE IS HERE

Did you know that all it takes is a teaspoon of salt to permanently pollute 5 gallons of water? Wisconsin has been using salt on roads since the 1950's. Since then, there has been millions of tons of salt applied to roadways that have washed off into soils, waterways, and Lake Michigan. Salt has always been the most cost effective and prevailing way of removing snow and ice from roads. Unfortunately, the environmental impact has become serious, so different

ways of keeping roads safe in the winter months have been studied. Salt is not only impacting our lakes and streams, it also contributes to degrading pavement surfaces, has a negative impact on

plants and animals, can burn our furry friends paws when out for a walk, and has become increasingly more expensive.

Municipalities have slowly been transitioning to utilizing brine both in combination with salt and on its own. Brine is basically a liquid mixture of salt and water. It can be applied directly to road surfaces (direct application) and also sprayed on salt as it is spread (prewetting salt). There are benefits to both styles of application. Most roads, bridges, and overpasses benefit from the direct application method. Brine helps to keep a bond from forming between snow and the road surface. This allows for cleaner and more efficient plowing. It can also be put down on roads days before a weather event to help keep snow, ice, and frost at bay. Brine works faster than road salt and reduces quantity. When brine is applied to salt as it is discharged from a truck, it helps to activate the salt quicker, and also makes the salt "stickier" to keep it from bouncing off the road. This "pre-wetting" method works great when salting roads at a higher speed to keep the wetted salt on the road.

The Sheboygan County Highway Department has increased brine use on roads they are contracted to clear. The Town of Wilson worked with Wagner Excavating to utilize brine in the 2023-2024 winter season. Wagner purchased a dedicated truck along with tank, sprayer, and calibrated electronics to directly apply brine to our town roads. You may have seen the truck out a few times already and thus far this season, this new system of brining is working very well. Remember, it is a pro-active approach in treating roads so don't be surprised if you see the brining truck out on a sunny 40 degree day. With the mild winter we are experiencing, there have been plenty of mornings of frost trying to form on

> roads. Brining has been the best solution to combating slippery early morning roads and keeping the environment in mind. We have seen measurable savings in transitioning to brine application as well.

There are a lot of variables when it comes to weather and treating roads, but the brining has definitely started off on the right foot and we will continue to improve the processes. Salt won't be going away anytime soon, but anything we can do to limit its use and still keep our roads safe, is the game plan for the future. ### **HASTA LA VISTA POTHOLES**

The Town of Wilson has approximately 40 miles of roads. 20 miles of those roads are owned and maintained by the town. The remainder are county roads. A road has a life expectancy of 20 years give or take. That means about a mile of roadwork should be performed every year to keep up with the cycle. There are different methods of replacing roads as well as maintenance treatments that can prolong the life of a road. Between pulverizing and paving, overlays, and chip or slurry sealing, the town does what it can to keep our roads in the best condition possible within budget constraints. It is a slow, costly process to maintain our point A to point B infrastructure. There are many factors which need to be analyzed before it can be determined that a road should be redone. Volume of traffic, speed of traffic, state road ratings, available funds or grants, and town budget are all factors. In conjunction with road projects, betterment and culvert replacements are often performed which add to costs.

For 2024, our largest project will be pulverizing and paving a sizable portion of Frontage Road starting at the intersection of Highway V going north just past Stahl Road. The Town of Wilson has contracted the Sheboygan County Highway Department to perform the roadwork. Frontage Road has been seriously degrading over the years and now with added traffic from new businesses, it is time for the road to be redone. The new road will be 5" thick asphalt which is slightly thicker than a normal road so to handle the extra traffic as well as truck traffic.

There are 3 other roads in the town that are slated to be redone this year. Wahgouly Road, Curtiss Drive, and Pioneer Road East are up for replacement. Along with the roadwork, some minor betterment will be carried out as to aid in keeping water off the roads.

In addition to the planned road replacements, the Town will be having some minor road patches done as well as some surface treatments (chip sealing). This type of maintenance treatment is not suitable for every road, but it does extend the life of the road generally, adding 7 to 10 years of life, if not more. The list of roads to get these patches and chip sealing is pending.

The Town of Wilson has contracted the Sheboygan County Highway Department to do all the planned roadwork and chip sealing this year. Construction dates have not ben set yet. Residents located along the affected roads will receive letters notifying them of the construction schedules.
